“A student from a family in the top 20 percent of socioeconomic status is more than six times more likely to receive gifted services than a student in the bottom 20 percent.” These gaps remain substantial even after taking into account students’ achievement levels and other background factors, and sorting of students across schools.

Socioeconomic status dictates which children get into ...

Children from low-SES families enter high school with average literacy skills five years behind those of high-income students (Reardon, Valentino, Kalogrides, Shores, & Greenberg, 2013). In 2014, the high school dropout rate among persons 16–24 years old was highest in low-income families (11.6 percent) as compared to high-income families (2.8 percent; National Center for Education Statistics, 2014).

Still, studies have also shown that given the right conditions, every student - including those from less fortunate circumstances - have the opportunity to succeed.

On the other hand, students of a lower SES are not only largely without access to these additive programs, they're also at a disadvantage at school. According to the APA, schools that serve mostly low-income students are often understaffed, experiencing high teacher turnover and unable to hire the same caliber of educator as their more well-funded counterparts.

Socioeconomic status forms a huge part of this equation. Children raised in poverty rarely choose to

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behave differently, but they are faced daily with overwhelming challenges that affluent children never have to confront, and their brains have adapted to suboptimal conditions in ways that undermine good school performance.

How Poverty Affects Behavior and Academic Performance

Like Mark, students from low-SES backgrounds might display behaviors that interfere with their ability to succeed in school. As Mark's teacher did, school personnel sometimes assume that the student in question is unmotivated, lazy, or apathetic about school.

Yet, as Tough points out, more than 50 percent of school-aged kids are now coming from low-income families, without the optimal cognitive or emotional development to succeed as students. Disadvantaged kids with neuro-cognitive problems should not be blamed for having trouble learning to read and write early on, he writes.

How to Help Low-Income Students Succeed - Greater Good

Socioeconomic status (SES) is an economic and sociological combined total measure of a person's work experience and of an individual's or family's economic and social position in relation to others. When analyzing a family's SES, the household income, earners' education, and occupation are examined, as well as combined income, whereas for an individual's SES only their own attributes are assessed.

Because of poverty, "Students from low-income families are 2.4 times more likely to drop out than middle-income kids, and over 10 times more likely than high-income peers to drop out" For children with low resources, the risk factors are similar to others such as juvenile delinquency rates, higher

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levels of teenage pregnancy , and the economic dependency upon their low-income parent or parents. [142]

While national high school dropout rates have steadily declined, dropout rates for children living in poverty have steadily increased. Low-income students fail to graduate at five times the rate of middle-income families and six times that of higher income youth (National Center for Education Statistics, 2016).
